Greetings Fellow Kin,

I hope that you all had a great summer, even if it did go by way too fast! On a positive note, the end of summer means that we get to dive into another fun filled Kin Year. As a member of the Back to the Future Team, I am really looking forward to working everyone, to help our District and your club attain the membership goals that we have set for the year.

Our teams main Membership focus for the 2015-2016 Kin year is one that has been on the radar for several years now...**RETENTION!** I am sure that it is a word that you are more than a little familiar with. In Kin, we use it a lot when talking about Membership...along with the words Recruitment and Rejuvenation. All three are important, when it comes to our clubs, but the numbers really show us why Retention is so important.

As of June 30, 2015, District 1 had a total of 1434 members. In the 12 months preceding that date, our clubs recruited 185 new members, and reinstated 35 former members. That looks pretty good, until you hear that we also said good bye to 248 members during the same period.

One thing that we are really good at is recruiting new members....which is fantastic! Along with the members that we already have, new members are the future of this wonderful Association. The question is - How do we go about keeping the valuable members that we already have, so that they can help us develop and mentor the new members that we are so good at recruiting?

Some of the things that immediately come to mind are *respect, education, fun, efficiency in meetings, personal development and fellowship.* Those are all things that are part of what makes a great Kin experience for our members. If we work to check off all of those 'boxes', we can show our members how valuable and rewarding being a part of Kin can be. We show that aspect to our potential and new members....but we also need to remember to ensure that our existing members are getting the same experience.

There are a couple of ideas that we are working at putting into play this coming year:

- First of all, we would like to get feedback from the members themselves, on what they think is and is not working for their club. This is going to be done via survey, and will be a combination of Club Identity questions and opportunities to provide feedback anonymously, but specific to your club. A hard copy of this survey will be included in the upcoming District mailing, and an electronic version will be sent out via email. We are hoping that this information, combined with the statistics and information from past Deputy Governors and visitation reports compiled by the NMC and the Go Team last year, will help us to get a better picture of what is going in the clubs of District 1.
- Secondly, the Back to the Future Team is committed to providing your club with whatever support you feel that you need...from Kin Education to Membership Plans to Conflict Resolution to name a few. All you have to do is ask!

Our Kinsmen/Kinette/Kin Clubs have a huge impact on our communities, and in order to ensure that continues to be the case, we need to ensure that we are keeping the members that are the life blood of this Association. Our members are the key to our success!

Reminder from the District Treasurer ..

WELCOME BACK! To a new Kin year!

I hope the summer treated you all very well.

As always... **DUES ARE DUE** .. but in this case, dues are **OVERDUE**.

As well, we need to inform you of a clause in the National Policies and Procedures that needs to be followed:

National Policy 3.04 Appointment, Certification and Registration of Accredited Delegates,
 c) Certification process

(xii) The Club must be In Good Standing as of thirty-five (35) days prior to the date of submission; otherwise the Club shall forfeit its votes at the District/Zone convention or conference to which the Form applies.

With this in mind, and the deadline for submission of your Accredited Delegate Form being October 31st,

dues MUST BE REMITTED NO LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 27th ..

for you to be in good standing and able to vote at Fall Leadership Conference.

We have 68% of our clubs currently in good standing with dues having been remitted. If you are one of the dangling clubs, please ensure that you pay your invoice asap.

If you are missing your invoice, drop me a line and I'll make sure that I get one out to you right away.

As we get back into the swing of all of the necessary evils of club organization and operations, I just wanted to remind all clubs that as per our House Rules,

ARTICLE 14 - Finance

Section 2 - Financial Reporting

4. Each Club shall forward a reviewed financial statement of all of the Club's accounts for the preceding year ending June 30th, and the Clubs approved budget for the current year, to the District Treasurer and their Zone Deputy Governor, not later than October 31st.

It is important that club finances are kept in check and up to date. I look forward to receiving your documents by end of October. Please also note, that "reviewed" means that your books should be looked at and signed



off by someone outside of your club. If you are struggling to find someone, check with your Deputy Governor or myself for suggestions.

If so, contact Governor's Katie and Curtis by October 30th. Please include a brief description of your skills related to conflict resolution.





Partnering with CBS helps to fulfill a huge national need while providing Kin Canada an avenue to raise our service profile through large reaching, non-monetary service projects. The best part of a KIN-CBS partnership

is that it is a great compliment to the Kin-Fibrosis Canada partnership, as well as Organ Donation Awareness Campaign Canadian Blood Service's role in providing national leadership and awareness for organ, eye and tissue donation.



Benefits of Family Kin Clubs

Mentorship, a sense of belonging, community awareness and quality family time.

Role of Kin Kids (up to grade 9) and Kin Juniors (up to age 19)

Kids and Juniors will participate in the planning of events with other club members. They will host at least one event per year with the guidance from adult members. They will learn age appropriate logistics of events, club administration and have fun!

What is the Minimum Number of Families Required to Charter a New Club?

A new club must have a minimum of 10 families or 12 adults. If your existing club would like to become a Family Kin Club no minimum is mandated.

Family Club Membership Structure

- All events or fundraisers MUST include the family and be family friendly.
- Any adult can join even if they don't have children.
- Once a Kin Junior turns 19, they will be required to pay the same dues as a Campus Club Member,
 if they are still a student. Once they are no longer a student, they will be required to pay the same
 dues as adult members within the club.
- The legal guardian of the child must be a registered Kin member of the family club. Legal guardianship can be given to another adult member by way of consent.
- Any club may adopt and be recognized as a Family Kin Club as long as they meet the full mandate.
- Existing clubs are only required to change their name if they are not already a Kin Club. The word
 family will not appear in the legal name of the club as it will only be a designation.
- Family Club Executive Members will be responsible for advising their District and Zone teams if they are planning to attend their events to ensure they are family friendly.

Family Club Member Dues

Kin Kids and Kin Juniors will not be required to pay dues, however, there is a one-time fee of \$5 for their Kin participant name badge.

The first adult of each family, within the club, will pay 100% of regular Kin member dues. Second and third subsequent family members (who must live within the same household) will receive a 15% rebate.

### Name Badges and Dinner Pins; the Do's and Don'ts

Hello Fellow Kin. It's a new Kin year and time for a bit of Kin Education. There are two very important items you received in your new member's kit. Now, that may have been in this past Kin year or it may have been many moons ago, either way, these two items are still just as important in our Kin lives.



Your dinner pin and your name badge are two treasures that should always be with you at all Kin events. I have noticed through my travels that a great number of members don't always wear them as they are intended to be worn. If you wear your name badge on your left side two finger widths above your heart and your dinner pin on your left lapel or two finger widths above your name badge then you're in the minority and doing great! Here's a quick list of "do's and don'ts" that you can reference if you're ever in question and if you don't find the answer you're looking for here, please don't hesitate to call on any number of seasoned Kin who take an interest in protocol.

Do – Wear your dinner pin at all Kin functions including club projects, meetings, special Kin social functions such as life memberships, anniversaries and charter nights, FLC, Zone Conference and District Convention.

Do – Wear your name badge at all Kin functions including club projects, meetings, special Kin social functions such as anniversaries and charter nights, FLC, Zone Conference and District Convention. \*Note: only Life Members should wear their name badges when attending a life membership celebration.


Don't – ever, under any circumstances pierce your name badge to put your dinner pin through it. Though this may be a convenient way to remember to wear both, it is a definite no-no.

Don't – wear your name badge on a lanyard with many different pins. This may be a great personal reminder of all the things you've done, but it doesn't provide a professional appearance for meetings and meeting new members and the public.

Do – wear the name badge add on of your current position and special awards you may have received such as Maple Leaf, Gem or DLS Graduate. Only your current position should be on your name badge. This makes it clear to potential members, guests and the general public as to which position you currently hold.

I hope you have found this list helpful. One last request I have is that going forward, if your club is looking to order new Kin shirts, please strongly consider having the Kin crest placed on the right breast so that you have plenty of room on your left side for the proper items.

Have a fabulous Kin year and I look forward to seeing you all, following the do's.

### Volunteers and Risk Management

Volunteers are one of the most important assets of non-profit and charitable organizations in Canada. They bring time, enthusiasm, and skills to the organization. They can also make the delivery of programs far more cost-effective. Many programs would fold if they did not have the support of volunteers.

### You can't escape risk

Running a service project will inherently result in risk. Many clubs are dealing with some of the most difficult issues facing our country and our world. If you want zero risk, you might as well dissolve the organization today. However, ignoring risk or throwing up one's hands and claiming that reducing risk is futile is also not helpful. Trying to manage and reduce risk is a very important and worthwhile activity for any club that is striving to run an effective operation and is working to preserve its reputation and assets.

Good volunteers are hard to recruit and often organizations accept anyone who offers to help. Having no standards, procedures, and policies can diminish the organizations programs and create unintended liabilities.

Risk management is an important part of proper stewardship of the assets of a club. Failure to manage risks can result in damage to the club including injuries to people or assets, financial costs to the club, and perhaps most importantly, loss of reputation and goodwill. Goodwill for most clubs is their most important asset. Without goodwill, it would be very hard to raise funds, attract volunteers, and implement your program.

### Insurance vs. risk management

For some, the words "risk management" and "insurance" are synonymous. Actually, insurance is only a very small part of risk management. Insurance is ostensibly "risk transfer". You are paying an insurance company, often an exaggerated amount, to transfer some of the economic consequences of certain very narrowly defined risks to the insurance company. Insurance is a business. There is nothing wrong with business. However, many insurance policies have huge exclusions, and some only cover liabilities that are very unlikely to happen or where the cost of them happening is nominal. They exclude the common problems and often cap the serious liabilities. In addition, insurance only covers some of the financial costs of a liability or lawsuit. It does not cover the damage to one's reputation and goodwill or the stress on volunteers or members. Therefore, while insurance can provide certain advantages, it is only a very small piece of the puzzle of avoiding risk.

What is appropriate risk management for one large club with lots of resources may not be the same for a smaller club that lacks those resources. The best part of risk management is that many risks can be easily reduced without costing lots of money or impairing the ability of the organization to conduct its programs.

### Twenty-Nine ideas for reducing risk when using volunteers

- 1. Have a club risk management policy in place, which sets out some procedures and policies to reduce risk.
- 2. Create a volunteer handbook with all policies that members need to be aware of and comply with.
- 3. Assign someone or a committee to review risk management procedures in your club, including policies and procedures for non-member volunteers.
- 4. Have a volunteer coordinator.
- 5. Think about all the activities of the club and the risks that your club can face and make a list of them.
- 6. Prioritize the risks in term of likelihood and effect.
- 7. Think of ways to deal with risk and decide on timelines for dealing with different types of risk.
- 8. Different member opportunities may have vastly different levels and types of risks associated with them.

- 9. Consider eliminating an excessively risky program or temporarily stopping that program until some of the risk can be dealt with or minimized. Sometimes the executive must draw lines about what activities are too risky to involve the club or to involve volunteers.
- 10. Have members complete a written application form with all necessary information about themselves including contact information, background, skills, references, consent to check references, etc.
- 11. Interview volunteers, preferably face-to-face, to ensure they understand their responsibilities and that they would be a good fit for your club or event.
- 12. Have volunteers and members sign a written volunteer agreement, which states they are not an employee, and include a code of conduct, risks associated with activity and waivers, and expectations you have of the volunteer, etc.
- 13. It is acceptable to reimburse volunteers for reasonable out of pocket expenses, but if you go beyond that you may have a risk that the "member" or "volunteer" could make a claim that they are an "employee" with all the associated rights.
- 14. Conduct reference checks.
- 15. If the volunteer or member will be working with youth or vulnerable persons, then consider doing criminal background checks and far more vigorous background checks.
- 16. Have an orientation program for new volunteers and members.
- 17. Train volunteers in their specific duties with an emphasis on risk management.
- 18. Create a job description for each volunteer position that identifies the title, purpose of the position, scope of position, expectation, reporting relationships, time commitment, length of appointment, if there are any required qualifications, etc.
- 19. Insurance check what insurance you have and what insurance you should have. Discuss with Melanie Nieson at Kin HQ your requirements and whether or not you will be covered or will need additional coverage. Insurance may be helpful in covering harm to volunteers and harm caused by volunteers and members.
- 20. Respond appropriately to inappropriate or illegal behaviour by members and volunteers. Fire members or volunteers who seriously misbehave or abuse others. For those who do not do what is reasonably expected from them and outlined in their volunteer contract or the code of conduct of the club, consider discussing their shortcomings with them or reassignment. But if neither is feasible, consider terminating. It is best to have a policy that deals with how problems will be handled and to uniformly apply such policy.
- 21. Have plans in place to deal with different contingencies or disasters. Although plans rarely work perfectly, having a plan, training on it, and practicing it will make people more likely to understand some of the variables even if they need to adopt the plan on the spur of the moment.
- 22. Is the physical space in which your members are working safe?
- 23. Is adequate security in place?
- 24. Are dangerous items appropriately stored?
- 25. Do volunteers have access to appropriate safety equipment?
- 26. Be prepared to turn away volunteers if you do not require their services or if they do not have the right skills or "fit" with the organization.
- 27. Provide guidance and supervision to volunteers and members.
- 28. Have policies that clarify the appropriate use of the organization's equipment, including vehicles and computers.
- 29. Risks change and evolve review your organization and risks every year or two.

# Top 10 Web Strategy Tips for Kin

- Your Club website (or Club page on the District website) should be the authoritative source of information about your Club. Any posts on external websites, including social media platforms, should direct traffic back to your website.
- 2. Request links to your Club website from community partners and groups you support.
- 3. Combine the best of your website (a stable, consistent, accessible platform) with the best of social media (engagement) by including "share" buttons, comment boxes, etc. on your website. Many social media sites have tools or "widgets" that incorporate the social aspects of their platform on your site.
- Social media success is based on engagement, not broadcasting. Like any relationship, it takes time and
  effort to build those relationships and engage more and more people through social media.
- 5. Have a plan, including the purpose and objectives of your social media activities. If you're going to do something, be sure you understand why you are doing it and what "success" looks like. Your social media goals could include increased "likes" or "retweets", additional ticket sales or participants for a project, donations of prizes or supplies, or new members.
- 6. Your Club should have a communication strategy, outlining who will be responsible for posting certain types of information or posting on certain platforms. Make sure everyone who needs to be is "in the know". Have a plan and a designated person to deal with negative posts, complaints, or bad news relating to your Club. It is always best to respond openly, honestly and transparently with a consistent message from one designated person. Nothing can turn simple mistakes into scandals faster than conflicting reports, cover-ups, differing opinions from within an organization, or getting into a public argument on social media.
- 7. Create an "editorial calendar" to make sure social media and website updates are part of every project and event checklist. This process will also help you plan out ideas for other posts to engage your supporters, whether it be Member or partner profiles, photos or articles of past events, or "human interest" photos showing the fun, fellowship, and hard work that goes on behind-the-scenes.
- Make sure your posts are a combination of content from others (curated content, sharing), recognition of partners, members and supporters, and "self-serving" posts (recruitment, event promotion, ticket sales).
- To help engagement, make sure a number of your posts end with a "?" Ask questions to elicit feedback, ideas, begin conversations and build relationships.
- 10. Include photos or videos where possible. Visual elements will help your post stand out in the reader's overcrowded feed, and increase the chance of your post being shared. Make sure that you have permission from the photographer or original source of the photo if you are uploading it (as opposed to sharing or retweeting their post), or use a stock image website to purchase photos. If using a "free" source, always keep a paper trail by printing off the page and license details, or saving a copy of the page.

### Bonus Tip:

Include paid advertising ("pay per click") on social media platforms to increase the number of people you can connect with quickly. This is especially helpful for promoting events or ticket sales, and can either target people currently engaged with your Club or help you reach a larger audience.

**The "Making Ontario Roads Safer Act", or Bill 31**, was approved unanimously in June and came into effect Sept. 1 – meaning some new rules for drivers and, in many cases, heavier penalties for breaking them.

Here is a look at five new traffic laws that are most likely to affect your everyday driving.

**Distracted driving:** If you're caught looking at your phone, texting or talking on your phone while driving, you will face much bigger fines and more demerit points, the province is warning. The current fine for distracted driving is approximately \$200. As of Tuesday, Sept 1 those found guilty of distracted driving will face an increased set fine of \$490 and three demerit points upon conviction. Drivers with G1 or G2 licenses could have their permits suspended on the spot.

**Pedestrian crossovers:** Drivers will have to wait until pedestrians have completely crossed the road at pedestrian crossovers and school crossings before proceeding. About half of all fatal traffic accidents involving pedestrians occur at intersections, the Ministry of Transportation said. The new law is an attempt to make roads safer for pedestrians. This change will take effect in January.

**Passing cyclists:** Drivers will have to give cyclists at least one metre of room wherever possible. The fine for breaking this rule has not yet been set. Motorists who open the door of their vehicle into the path of a cyclist without checking will face increased set fines of \$365 and three demerit points upon conviction.

**The "move over" law:** As for Sept. 1, drivers will be require to slow down and move into the next lane whenever they see a stopped emergency vehicle with its red and blue lights flashing. This will apply to stopped tow trucks that have amber lights flashing. The fine for breaking these rules will be \$490 and three demerit points.

**Alcohol and drugs:** Those caught driving under the influence of drugs will now face the same penalties as drunk drivers, the ministry said. These include between a three and 90-day license suspension and a weeklong vehicle impoundment. More than 45 per cent of drivers killed in Ontario were found that have drugs or alcohol in their systems.


