The Canadian Facts & Figures on Cystic Fibrosis

Did you know...

- Of the Canadians with cystic fibrosis who died in 2011, half were under 34 years old
- One in every 3,600 children born in Canada has cystic fibrosis
- 50% of Canadians with cystic fibrosis are diagnosed by six months of age, and 73% are diagnosed by the age of two
- Approximately 4,000 individuals with cystic fibrosis attend one of the 42 specialized cystic fibrosis clinics across Canada
- One in 25 Canadians carries a defective version of the gene responsible for cystic fibrosis
- More than 1,900 mutations in the CFTR gene have been identified, however nearly 91.5% of individuals with CF in Canada carry at least one copy of the most common CFcausing mutation, ΔF508
- In the 1960's, most children with cystic fibrosis did not live long enough to attend kindergarten
- Nearly 60% of all individuals with cystic fibrosis in Canada are adults
- 86% of individuals with cystic fibrosis must take pancreatic enzymes to digest food and absorb nutrients
- 30% of female adults with cystic fibrosis and 17% of male adults with CF are classified as underweight
- 44 CF patients received transplants in 2011, more than double compared to a decade ago

MEAFORD KINETTES SWING FOR A CURE

Women's Golf Tournament for Breast Cancer hits milestone, over \$105,000.00 in 14 years.....

Where do new ideas come from for service projects? The idea for our Breast Cancer golf tournament started at a Ford Introduction car show in Toronto, spring of 1999. The President of the Ford Motor Company of Canada was telling the dealers about Ford's involvement with the CIBC "Run for the Cure". My mother had battled breast cancer and I just had a strong desire to do something. What could we do to help fight this dreadful disease? How about a golf tournament?



When I presented the idea to the Meaford Kinettes they were more than willing to get involved with this very worthwhile project. We started with Bumstead Ford of Meaford as our major sponsor, now it is Peninsula Ford Lincoln Meaford. We set up a Kinette committee and the ideas were flowing. We designed a logo for our golf tournament with the title "Swing for the Cure". The decision was made to go with an18 hole golf tournament, best ball, shotgun start, open to golfers and non-golfers alike. We wanted it to be a fun day that everyone could be involved in and not feel intimidated. We had many people sign up who had never been on a golf course before. That was the start of an inspiring project for the Kinette Club of Meaford. We have only gotten bigger and better every year since 2000.

The entry fee is \$ 100.00 per golfer. This includes breakfast snacks, lunch, supper, 18 holes of golf, golf cart and every golfer receives a boodle

bag. We take individual team pictures, which they all receive a copy of to take home.

Our raffle table has so many beautiful gifts, thanks to our many sponsors. As well as our raffle table we sell draw tickets on a set of Women's Breast Cancer Golf Clubs, framed photograph and handmade afghan. We have a competition for Best Team Costumes. We run a hole called "Swing with the Meaford Kin". For \$5.00 you receive a sleeve of golf balls and you can use one of our dedicated Kinsmen's drives as your own. This year we had a fancy golf cart to raffle off compliments of VanDolder's Kitchen & Bath. The winner and her foursome used the cart for the day. Our hole sponsorship has really helped with our donation to The Breast Cancer society of Canada. All funds raised go directly to Breast Cancer research.

As a club we wanted to be sure all of our sponsors were recognized. The Print Shop in Collingwood designs us a pamphlet and it is given to every golfer at dinner. It lists all the businesses and individuals that have helped to make our golf tournament a success. We also send a pamphlet and thank you, **personally**, to each and every one of our sponsors.

We have had 100% involvement from our club, our community and all the sponsors. Without all their support this would not have been possible. It is at times like this that you love belonging to a service club and to have the feeling that you are helping so many people. We all realize that this cause is a great one and we have to do our part to find a cure for this dreadful disease.







DELHI - Residents in Delhi put on their dancing shoes on Saturday to support epilepsy awareness. The Kinette Club of Delhi hosted the Kin You Dance 'Til Midnight dance-a-thon at the Knights of Columbus hall from 8 a.m. to midnight in honour of Tanner Wheeler, 3, who died in March. "We thought we would do something (in his honour)," said Leana Serrador, president of the Kinette. "Everyone in town knows what happened." Tanner was diagnosed with epilepsy when he was 10-months-old.

"He battled every day," said his father Jeff Wheeler at the dance-a-thon. Dancers paid \$10 per person to dance all day with all proceeds going to Epilepsy Canada. "It means a lot to have people actually come together like this," said Tanner's mother Lisa. "It's an inspiration. Tanner would have been really thankful," added Jeff.

While the Kinettes didn't see as many movers and shakers as they would have liked to see at the dance, those in attendance had fun dancing to a DJ, eating chili and playing games. "We are having fun, which is the whole point," said Serrador. Epilepsy is also an important cause for at least one of the Kinette's members. Cindy Deelen has lived with epilepsy her entire life. "There is not much of a spotlight on (the condition)," she said. She also noted most people don't know what to do when a person has a seizure. Many people believe you should insert something into the mouth of a person having a seizure, which isn't true said Deelen. The dance is the first large-scale event the Kinettes have hosted themselves since being officially chartered last April after a 10-year hiatus. The club is going strong, while still in its infancy. "We are always looking for new members," said Serrador.

7 WAYS TO SAMPLE LIVING WITH LESS

1. Clothes. According to statistics, we wear 20% of our clothes 80% of the time. That means that many of us have closets full of clothes that we no longer like or no longer fit us correctly. They are just taking up space. The simple exercise of going through your closet and removing all unused clothing leaves your closet lighter, your mornings less stressful, and your wardrobe full of things you love. 2. Decorations. Many of the decorations in our homes hold no personal value to our lives. They just simply happened to match the color of the carpet or be on sale when we walked into the store.

Unfortunately, they are distracting you and your guests from the decorations in your home that share your story and highlight your values. Take a moment to walk through your home with a discerning eye. Leave only the decorations that are the most meaningful and the most beautiful. Your home will begin to share your story in a beautiful way. And your old decorations will likely end up on sale at your next garage sale.

3. Toys. Too often, we fall into the line of thinking that says more is better... and so do our kids. We begin to purchase and collect far too many toys for our children. As a result, our children have no need to learn how to be creative, helpful,

careful, or sharing. In that regard, fewer toys may benefit your kids in numerous ways. Although you may want to consult your children before you relocate their unused toys, there's a pretty good chance that after only a few weeks the old, unused toys will be forgotten (except by whomever used to pick them all up).

4. Cooking Utensils. There never seems to be enough storage space in our kitchens. Yet most of our grandmothers cooked far more often, far more elaborately, and far better than many of us today... in much smaller kitchens. The truth is that when it comes to cooking, simple is almost always better. We need far less cooking utensils than we currently own. As a result, our drawers, cabinets, and countertops can be far better

organized and useful if we simply owned less. To give this experiment a shot, check out this article from the New York Times: A No Frills Kitchen Still Cooks. Then, store all your unnecessary utensils in a plastic bin, put them away out of sight, and see if you just enjoy cooking a little bit more in your new, clutter-free environment.

5. Televisions. According to Nielsen, the average person watches 4 hours, 35 minutes of television each day. And the average American home now has more television sets than people. That threshold was crossed within the past two years. There are 2.73 TV sets in the typical home and 2.55 people. In the average American home, a television set is turned on for more than a third of the day -8

hours, 14 minutes to be exact. We are literally sitting on the couch while life passes us by. Experiment with owning less televisions. As a result, you will watch less. And when you do, you will be more apt to do it together as a family.

6. Counter-tops. Clutter is a form of distraction. It pulls at our attention and redirects our thoughts – even for just an instant. Everything sitting out on your countertops competes for your attention. Unfortunately, we have become so accustomed to these distractions that we don't even notice them anymore... until they are removed. Experiment, even for just 7 days, with keeping your

countertops completely clear. Store things in drawers, cabinets, pantries, or temporary storage boxes. After one week, you'll likely return some of it for the sake of convenience, but I'd bet my bottom dollar that you won't return all of it.

7. Furniture. It may require some heavy-lifting, but if you're up for the challenge, removing excess furniture from your rooms will immediately open up significant space and airflow in your home. The rarely-used pieces of furniture in your home are quickly recognizable and taking up more space than you realize. Oh sure, this experiment requires a place to store your furniture during the trial period, but it's a quick and easy way to remove some of the largest clutter from your home.




Choice, Not Chance
