The Future

A few days ago I was asked to represent my company at a local career expo for youth. I was thrilled to take this opportunity – not only was it great for our company to be out in the public, but having graduated from high school eight years ago I quickly recalled how much I would have loved an opportunity to explore different career paths prior to choosing my post-secondary education.

The youth expo featured many different companies and career paths including police, fire department, entrepreneurship, physiotherapy, manufacturing, military and so on. Each student was given a list of questions that they were to ask the different representatives, and in return they would receive a stamp on their "passport" and be entered to win some pretty awesome prizes. The day was planned out to the minute and with over 600 students from Collingwood and surrounding area, we figured we would be very busy chatting and promoting different career opportunities.

Our day started and to say the least, it was a struggle. Again, a reminder that only eight years ago I graduated from this very high school that I was standing in, so I was kind of shocked at the differences I noticed... Below are some observations and thoughts I have about why the day, in my opinion, was such a struggle.

- Who doesn't love a day out of classes? I know I used to! Attending the expo was a great
 opportunity to just wander around and not have to be sitting in a class room. If students
 weren't overly engaged in wanting to learn more about potential career paths, it was easy
 enough to mosey past each booth and ignore the company representatives.
- Free stuff! Everyone loves free stuff! It amazed me at how many students walked up and bluntly asked "can you stamp my passport?". Don't get me wrong, I'm all about winning things, however I do believe in following the rules, and therefore refused to just stamp passports without being asked a few questions. I can't answer why I think they just assumed we'd stamp the passport, but it reminded me that in life you can't just sneak by without putting some effort and work into things. I do hope that the so called "easy way out" isn't always taken or expected.
- Communication. Communication. I must say the communication (or lack thereof) was my biggest "wow" moment of the day. I was shocked at how difficult it was to converse with most students, even with their pre-determined questions. I felt like I was constantly pulling teeth to talk to students – it should not have been a struggle to talk to them about their passions and dreams, but it was. So this leads me to a few thoughts on this topic.

I sometimes think we get so wrapped up in life and being busy that we rarely reflect on what we love, what we love to do, and what we are passionate about. 


This past year, Kin achieved their goal of 500 donated units!



Background

- Established in 2005 as the charitable arm of Kin Canada
- Public charitable foundation under Canada Revenue Agency regulations
- Any Kinsmen, Kinette or Kin Club in good standing may access Foundation as a vehicle to operate projects, using a standardized "Agency Agreement" between Club and Foundation
- Offers tax receipting and CRA reporting as part of wraparound service to clubs
- Conducts programs (see below) to facilitate fundraising and raise profile of Kin Canada
- Provides a vehicle for those wishing to make a gift to Kin as part of charitable or legacy donations;
 potential donors are encouraged to contact financial and legal advisors if contemplating a substantial gift to the Foundation

Governance

- Board of Directors includes up to two members appointed by Kin Canada National Board of Directors
- Remaining Foundation Board members (up to 13) are mostly individual members of Kin Canada clubs, but not all members are required to be Kin members
- Foundation Board seeks members with particular skill sets, e.g. financial planning, project administration, legal, communications, social media, etc.

Programs

Hal Rogers Fellow:

- Recognizes members, alumni and non-Kin who have made significant contribution to community or country
- · Proceeds from program go to permanent endowment fund to support Kin Canada

Portraits of Honour:

- Mural depicted 157 Canadians who died serving Canada in Afghanistan
- Mural toured Canada in 2011-2012
- Raised funds for Military Families Fund to assist families of the fallen and personnel returning with physical and/or emotional injuries

49th Parallel North Fund:

- Created to honour military personnel and first responders who died on Canadian soil
- Raises necessary funds to provide support to families of honorees, including assistance toward post-secondary or training expenses of family members

Kin ASSIST (program under development):

 Purpose – to provide support to individuals and families during or after devastating life events, including: life-threatening illnesses; hospital stays; vehicle collisions or industrial accidents; house fires or other catastrophic events

Kin Canada Foundation Hal Rogers Fellow The 49th Parallel North Fund

The Hal Rogers Fellow is the highest award given by the Kin Canada Foundation. This award was established to recognize Canadians who, by their leadership, accomplishments, and community endeavours, have demonstrated the high ideals to which Kin Canada Founder, Hal Rogers was committed. This award may also be given posthumously where circumstances warrant.

Objectives of the Fund

- To honour and show respect to our fallen Canadian First Responders. Military, Police, Firefighters and EMS by raising the necessary funds to award a Hal Rogers Fellow to their families.
- The Fund is designated to cover costs for the award and the required regalia associated with presenting the HRF award.
- A university or training fund for families of the fallen to access, through an
 application process, designed to assist the children to cover necessary postsecondary education or training expenses. ie. tuition-books-lodging-travel
- * The awards to be presented will follow the current HRF application guidelines.
- * Monetary Assistance will be through a Foundation Committee selection process.

History

- The catalyst for this fund was Cpl. Nathan Cirillo of Hamilton, a member of Founder Hal's Regiment. Cpl. Nathan Cirillo and Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent will be the first to receive this tribute from the Kin Canada Foundation with presentations on Monday, February 23rd, 2015 in respective locations.
- Kin Canada Founder, Harold (Hal) A. Rogers was a member of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Brigade.
- The Brigade originated in 1903 as the 91st "Highlanders." Ironically, the name was re-designated in 1920 as 'The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada.'
- Hamilton, Ontario was the birthplace of Kin. February 20th, 1920.
- Kin has a long standing record of supporting our Nations Military.
- Our structure in Kin is based on Military protocol.
- February 20th, 2015, Kin will Celebrate 95 years of 'SERVING.'
- Kin Canada supported our troops serving in Afghanistan with the Dave Sopha mural 'Portraits of Honour' National Tour. An astounding aggregate of 20% of the Troops serving in Afghanistan are/ were Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.
- Kin Canada was a Presenting Sponsor of the National Portraits of Honour Tour.

With the support of Kin Canada clubs and the Canadian public in this initiative, we can recognize Canadian Fallen First Responders and their families. Help us raise the necessary funds to provide the support, pride and solidarity that will honour Our Fallen.......




