REJUVENATION Q&A

What does Rejuvenation mean?

In terms of the Rejuvenation Series, including its seminar, Rejuvenation is about resolving the issues that distract from, or prevent, our purpose as Kin. Whether it's gossip/rumours, generation gap, not respecting each other, or a lack of (fun) mentoring, there are issues in a club that prevent it from being ultimately successful. These obstacles prevent the club from realizing its potential in terms of its purpose; serving the community's greatest need. (Not to mention... fun, fellowship, development, etc.)

The Rejuvenation Series/Seminar aims to address those issues. Once a club identifies, addresses, and then resolves its retention issues, the awesomeness that is Kin can take over and POW! The club is not only rejuvenated, but becomes a powerhouse in their community and in the association. Kin, in its truest form, is the most rejuvenating thing that can happen to a person and a community. If we as Kin can remove the obstacles that prevent us from being Kin in that truest form, rejuvenation will happen naturally.

Do we have to have someone come to the club and present it?

Not at all! Clubs, of course, have that option, but a club can use the program itself, easily. Visit www.kincanada.ca/rejuvenation and download the resources. There are six topic-specific brochures, each of which comes with a description of a club with that issue, an exercise to get the club to start addressing the issue, follow-up/outcome questions to ask and discuss after the exercise, and even some maintenance/follow-up information the club can use as it moves toward rejuvenation.

There are also a few case studies available. Using them is as easy as someone reading the case study out loud, then asking the questions and discussing, as a group, how it relates to issues within the club.

The Rejuvenation Series is a fantastic way to do something different for a meeting or social. For those clubs that are really struggling, this could be that turning point in the club on the path back to success.

How can we get someone to visit us and present it?

Super easy! Contact any member of the National Membership Committee or your District Membership Director. We'll work with you to make sure someone comes to visit your Club, Zone or District.

My Club/Zone/District just had a Rejuvenation Series session done. Now what?

There are a few "now what" items to choose from:

- Visit www.kincanada.ca/rejuvenation and click on the feedback survey link. The survey only takes a few minutes, but your feedback will contribute to the program's success for years to come.
- Try your hand at presenting some of the things you learned at the session to another District, Zone or Club, or your own club!
- Spread the word! Tell your fellow Kin, Clubs and Zones about the success you or your Club/Zone/District had with the Rejuvenation Series

What if my Club is already successful and doesn't have those issues?

With great awesomeness comes great responsibility. The way we see it; if your club is that darn awesome, then your club and its members have an obligation/responsibility to help other Kin/members be more awesome! Every Zone has a club that is in need of something... more fun, more projects, more fellowship, more education or just has disconnected and needs to be brought back in to "Kin". As a Club of Awesomeness, your next task should be helping out another club.

You won't just be helping a club... you'll be helping a community keep its Kin elements and you'll have directly and positively impacted the Association. In advance... THANK YOU!

How can I tell if my club needs to be Rejuvenated?

Ask yourself the following questions:

- Do all members feel they are respected and that they respect everyone else in the club?
- Does your club have great current and future leaders?
- Do all or most of the members participate in meetings and projects?
- Does your club have as many members as it wants to have?
- Do your club and its members communicate well?
- Do young/old, new/experienced, men/women get along in the Club?
- Does your club operate without being distracted by rumours, gossip, personality conflicts or "blow-ups"?
- Does your Club keep all its current members from year to year, with the exception of those that move away?

If you answered "Yes" to ALL of the questions, congratulations, you're probably one of those awesome clubs that we hope will help other clubs. If you answered "No" to any of the questions, the Rejuvenation Series is here to help.

Fines and a Fines Session



The Sergeant-at-arms is responsible for the physical order and control during the General meetings, and the collection of fines that have been levied against the members during the meeting or listed at the end of the meeting, prior to adjournment.

The purpose of a fine and fine session are numerous;

a) to ensure proper protocol and decorum is maintained throughout the business meeting

b) to acquire funds for your general account

- c) to teach our members the skill of thinking on their feet and speaking off the cuff
- d) they are fun!

The amount of each fine per infraction (i.e. Infractions relating to rules, procedures, conduct, order, attendance or other misdemeanors), along with the maximum amount of fines levied on any one member, should be reflected within your club's house rules so they don't get too far out of hand.

However, there are some protocols observed in certain clubs which add to the fun of a robust fines session. Fines can be levied at any time or a prescribed time during the meeting by any member. All members except

the Sergeant-at-arms and guests are usually fair game. Any member wishing to challenge or a respond to a fine levied against him/her may do so, but it costs them double regardless if they are right or not. It really doesn't matter if the fine is substantiated or not as the best ones are usually fictional anyways.



Fines are levied for any reason, real or manufactured and are intended to liven up the meeting and poke good natured fun at those who deserved it, or usually tend to have trouble follow them around...that is why, I personally have never been fined!

Kin Resource Manuals - A Key to Club Success

One of the basics of Kin is educating our members to ensure our clubs have success and as a result we provide service to our communities. To make sure clubs and members have the tools they need, the National Education Committee has developed and/or revised a number of resource manuals that can be used to answer any questions which might arise. The manuals can be found on the Kin Canada website by clicking on the Member Centre and then the Resource Library link.

Developed for use by the entire Club, the Successful Club Manual provides all members with information on the management of club operations including meetings, finances, committees, protocol, service, membership and club responsibilities districts and Kin Canada. Additional manuals for use at the club level include the following:

- 1. The Rules of Order handout provides a complete description of the Association's Rules of order and is designed to be printed using the two sided option, and can be left on the table for use by members during club meetings.
- 2. Critical Path: A step-by-step monthly path for clubs to follow to ensure all responsibilities within the club, to the district and Kin Canada are fulfilled.
- 3. Kin Education Manual: This manual is a consolidation of Kin information and has been designed as an educational tool for use by new and experienced members. This manual is designed to be used at the Zone and Club level and includes topics such the history and structure of the Kin Canada association, parliamentary procedures, elections, awards, conventions, membership and service projects. A club may also choose to use the Kin Education Manual Powerpoint to educate members at regular general meetings.

If club members are interested in looking beyond the club for additional Kin experience, also available are the Successful District Manual and the Successful Zone Manual. Providing information for the next levels of Kin leadership, the Zone manual provides the Deputy Governors what they need to work with their clubs to meet district and national requirements and to be successful within their communities. The District Manual has been developed to provide the district council the tools they need to lead their districts within Kin Canada.

Educating our members is fundamental to Kin. The National Education Committee encourages all clubs to designate one member as the Education Director. By utilizing the manuals as education tools, the Education Director can take one or two topics per meeting and provide both new and seasoned members with valuable information for the success of their clubs.

CYSTIC FIBROSIS CANADA VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT CONFERENCE

The inaugural CFC VEC was held the weekend of November 8th-10th in Toronto and was billed as being "about volunteers, designed by volunteers and led by volunteers". It represented an "exciting opportunity for Cystic Fibrosis Canada to honour and inspire its volunteer community as we all press to cross the goal line for our Cystic Fibrosis Community" – CEO Maureen Adamson.

The conference and the weekend lived up to its billing, offering education, inspiration, and networking and of course a great deal of Kin Fellowship.

Kin Service Directors from all districts were invited to participate in the weekend and our time was well spent in a variety of educational sessions and volunteer recognition celebrations.

Friday evening opened with a warm welcome from the CFC cast and crew, followed up by guest speaker and CF researcher, Dr. Neil Sweezey who addressed the genetics behind CF and the current research being done. Dr. Sweezey provided a look inside a cell and provided an easy to understand explanation of the five different types of CF mutations and how the greatest breakthrough drug, Kalydeco, is correcting the defect at the cellular level. He provided a real insight and understanding as to why there is so much hope for a cure in the near future. The evening concluded with a hospitality suite and stakeholders "fair" in which each stakeholder had a booth to promote what he or she does for Cystic Fibrosis. Our service director team ran a Kin booth and sold our "50th Anniversary" CF blue t-shirts and shared some good Kin spirit which was of course carried on into the wee hours of the morning in the "real" hospitality suite!

Saturday was jam packed with business with the morning kicking off with a second research oriented presentation by Dr. David Speert. The real focus of the day though was on volunteer engagement and knowledge sharing. Greetings Fellow Kin:

I am honoured to be the Charter President of the first interactive, e-Club, in Kin Canada. This is not a new concept in non-profits, just new to Kin. I have been asked by many to provide some details on how the club started and how it works, so I have provided this brief summary.

In late 2011 a small group of former members who were no longer members of traditional clubs, for various reasons, and wished to rejoin Kin started to talk. We realized there was no meaningful way to be a Kin member without belonging to a club. We were a group of eight living in different communities and we realized that there must be other former members out there that would want to rejoin and that other service groups have e-clubs, why couldn't Kin?

In December I reached out to HQ and spoke with E.D. Ric to discuss our idea. He was intrigued by the idea and encouraged our group to submit in writing a proposal on our concept and how we would operate and function as a potential pilot club. We submitted this in January to the charter and expansion committee and had discussions and meetings over the next few months.

We had a few bumps on our journey and at times the idea would die and then something new would happen and resurrect the concept, until April of this year when Steve Lowe of the Charter expansion committee pushed us again to give it another try. We once again met and submitted our concept, budget and club by-laws. After a few discussions and under the condition we met our minimum membership number we were given the blessing to proceed and try to charter a new club, not a pilot!

Our group went to work again, this time with a great support network. Melanie Nieson from HQ and Jen Burry from the District 7 executive were incredible with their encouragement, support and advice and were instrumental in getting the club going. We were able to get to our required membership numbers and have received many inquiries from others.

In September of this year our potential members included a past National President and 3 past Governors to go with 2 new members and our other former Kin members. These

members live in four different communities in NB and NS. In October of 2013, after almost two years of work, we held a fully online club election. Then on November 4, 2013 we had our first official meeting and at that meeting a motion was made and passed to officially seek to become a member club in Kin Canada! On Wednesday Nov. 13, 2013 we were officially notified that our application was accepted, and we have officially become a part of Kin History as the first interactive/online club. We are members of Kin Canada!

Our potential members can be from anywhere in Atlantic Canada, provided they are not an active member of another Kin club. We have an upper limit of 16 members and this will be reviewed each year. Our goal is to focus fundraising efforts on larger causes as opposed to local ones. We will raise funds for CF, MS, Kin Canada Bursaries, Kin Canada Foundation, IWK and the Canadian Cancer society to name a few.

We meet on the first Tuesday of each month, via telephone for now, but we are looking into alternative online methods and technologies. We are currently in the process of incorporating in NB as an extra-provincial non-profit which is a slow process, but it is moving forward. We are doing our first project as a club, a CF fundraiser that clubs in District 7 have been partnered with the Atlantic CF chapters for three years now.

We will be moving slowly at first when it comes to fundraising, small projects to get a sense of our capabilities, and our limits. We are also being careful to not intrude on the fundraising of traditional clubs in the areas we live. We will be setting up committees to look into traditional fundraising ideas as well as another to seek out online fundraising opportunities. We are actively seeking out corporate partners and have had preliminary discussions with two about fundraising opportunities.

We hope to have an official charter night in March or April 2014 and hope to have a large turnout of members from other clubs. Where we will have our charter has not been determined, but it will most likely be in Halifax or Bridgewater, NS. Our sponsor club is the Bridgewater and Area Kinsmen and we are very happy to have their support and advice. There have been a couple of other clubs that have expressed an interest in assisting us getting going and we are very thankful for them reaching out and hope that we will be able to partner.

We realize that this is not going to be an easy start but we are all invested in the club and are convinced that with patience and hard work that we will succeed! We look forward to seeing you all again and are honoured to be part of the future success of Kin Canada.

for even this short period of time. Her passion for Kin, for helping those of us who chose to take on out of club challenges, and for people in general is a quality that shines through her daily.





12 Tips for Holiday Home Safety



The <u>holidays</u> invite all sorts of fun activity, from lighting candles to hanging fresh greens and stringing lights. Here's how to keep your house and family safe from fire and injury.

As you're sprucing up your home this season, keep an eye out for these common <u>holiday</u> trip-ups, fire hazards, and other <u>safety</u> snafus.

- **1. Merry and Bright:** Carefully inspect holiday light strings each year and discard any with frayed cords, cracked lamp holders, or loose connections. When replacing bulbs, unplug the light string and be sure to match voltage and wattage to the original bulb.
- **2. Lights Out:** Always turn off holiday lights when you leave the house unattended or when going to bed.
- **3. Fresh Is Best:** Try to purchase a freshly cut tree, as they are more resistant to ignition. Keep your Christmas tree watered and away from open candles.
- **4. Timing Is Everything:** Use an outdoor timer certified by CSA International to switch lights on and off. Lights should be turned on after 7 p.m. to avoid the electricity rush hour.
- **5. Check for the Certification Mark:** When purchasing light strings, extension cords, spotlights, electrical decorations, gas appliances, or carbon monoxide alarms, look for the certification mark of an accredited certification organization such as CSA International, UL, or ELT to ensure that the products comply with applicable standards for safety and performance.















- **6. One and Done:** Never connect more than one extension cord together; instead use a single cord that is long enough to reach the outlet without stretching, but not so long that it can get easily tangled.
- **7. The Great Outdoors:** When hanging outdoor lights, keep electrical connectors off the ground and away from metal rain gutters. Use insulated <u>tape</u> or plastic clips instead of metal nails or tacks to hold them in place.
- **8. Climbing Up:** Using a ladder when you put up lights? Choose the correct ladder for the job and double check for a certification mark to ensure your portable ladder complies with applicable standards.
- **9. Keep the Gas Behind Glass:** Do not use your gas fireplace if the glass panel is removed, cracked, or broken, and only allow a qualified service person to replace fireplace parts.

- **10. Sound the Alarm:** Test your smoke alarms monthly to make sure they work, and be sure to install smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms on every level of your home -- especially near sleeping areas.
- **11. Filter-Friendly Furnace:** To help prevent CO hazards in your home, have a qualified heating contractor perform a yearly maintenance check of your furnace and venting system, and clean or replace your furnace filter frequently during the heating seasons.

12. Clean the Clutter: Do not store combustible materials such as gasoline, propane,

<u>paper</u>, chemicals, <u>paint</u>, rags, and cleaning products near your gas furnace. Gasoline or propane cylinders should be stored outside the home.


