Time to Spring Forward

Is your club finding it difficult to recruit new members? Are club finances limited to invest in your membership recruiting efforts?

If that is the case, you should make an application to the District 1 **Membership Fund**. The purpose of the Membership Fund is to support clubs in District 1 that are in need of financial assistance in their membership endeavours. To apply, a club will need to submit a detailed 2 year membership plan. The plan must include financial needs of the club, membership growth expectations, event proposals, and proposed training of current members and new members. In order to be eligible, clubs must be "in good standing" which includes being up to date on paperwork, dues, and other obligations at the Zone, District, and National levels of Kin.

Clubs can receive up to \$500.00 if their application is approved by the District Executive. Clubs can make applications to the District Membership Fund from July 1st to October 31st in a calendar year. The \$500.00 must be used for membership initiatives only and are not to be used to pay dues or any other expenses. A full expense report is due back to the District by October 31st the year following the 2 year plan.

The District has set aside \$5,000 towards this program from the District surplus. The \$5,000 will be replenished every year unless the District surplus falls below \$10,000. The District can approve up to 10 applications a year provided they are submitted on time.

If your club is struggling with membership, I implore you to make an application to the Membership Fund. Your club and your community will thank you for it later for the effort!

The race for the **Phil & Vicki Scalisi Membership Award** will end on March 31st. The award is given to the Kin Member who sponsors the most members from April 1st to March 31st. At the present time, yours truly is currently in the lead with 3 members. There are 13 people tied for second place with 2 members each, so the race to the finish line will be exciting. The winner will be announced at District Convention in Sarnia. Good luck to all in the hunt and remember to sponsor as many members as you can before March 31st. For those who have sponsored 2 new members already, if you sponsor 1 more member before June 30th you will receive a GEM Award.

The next charter in District 1 should be happening soon as we welcome the Wingham & District Kin Club to the Association. I would like to thank Mellisa Penner, DG Lisa Orth, and Glenn Dobben for all their hard work in making this charter a reality. Great job and we

look forward to welcoming the Wingham

charter with open arms.

CYSTIC FIBROSIS CANADA FUNDS A NATIONAL PRIMARY AIRWAY CELL BIOBANK

Cystic Fibrosis Canada has partnered with the Cystic Fibrosis Translational Research Centre (CFTRc) at McGill University in Montreal to create the Primary Airway Cell Biobank (PACB). Headed by Dr. John Hanrahan, Principal Investigator, and Dr. Renaud Robert, Director, the biobank is the first of its kind in Canada and is intended to be a nationwide resource of high-quality lung cells for cystic fibrosis (CF) research.

Before a potential new therapy for cystic fibrosis is allowed to enter clinical trials, its effectiveness must be demonstrated within lung cells in the lab. Cells from CF lungs are particularly useful because they behave similarly to those within the airways of CF patients and these cells are considered the 'gold standard' for CF research.

Following a lung transplant, the CF-afflicted lungs are typically discarded. However, the PACB uses this tissue to isolate these very valuable lung cells and makes them available to CF researchers across Canada. With informed consent and patient identity kept strictly confidential, CF lung tissue is obtained from the lung transplant recipient and provided by the transplant centre to the PACB, where cells are isolated and banked by skilled personnel.

This amazing resource is made possible with the support of Kin Canada through the funds donated over the years, and allows CF researchers to perform vital studies toward the discovery of new and better therapies to fight CF.

Thank you Kin Canada for the continued support in the fight against CF since 1964. Together, we will strive to find a cure or effective control for CF in our lifetime.

An Honour Deserved

On October 20th and 22nd, 2014, the Canadian landscape was forever changed. Canada lost two soldiers, in senseless acts. Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent was killed in a hit and run and Cpl. Nathan Cirillo was fatally shot while honouring our veterans at the War Memorial in Ottawa. Both tragic, however, with many wars and skirmishes around the globe, these attacks came to our home soil.

Both of these soldiers, performing their respective duties, came to signify a new time. In this country, we as Canadians rallied. We sat vigil, we questioned why and we began to realize that Canada is vulnerable. We came together as a nation. These soldiers both served our country, with the mission to protect the rest of us. It is time for us, as Kin, as Kin Canada to honour and pay homage to them.

Kin Canada responded. These men served as a catalyst for the Kin Canada Foundation to honour these fine soldiers. At a Foundation Board meeting the idea was discussed, a committee formed and within weeks the Foundation Board endorsed what became "The 49th Parallel North Fund." Designed to honour and respect our Fallen and assist their families. The program was expanded to include all Fallen Canadian First Responders, as each of them, placed themselves in danger, for the greater good of Canadians. These First Responders will be honoured with a Hal Rogers Fellow, and a portrait,



with each individuals name put forward and sponsored by a nominating club. The Foundation put out a 'Call to Action" for Warrant Officer Vincent and Cpl. Cirillo. Kin Canada clubs heard the call and supported the idea, raising over twenty thousand dollars at one Fall Leadership Conference in November, 2015.

The 49th Parallel North Fund, will honour our Fallen, but will also continue a lasting legacy by working to ensure their families we are able to assist with any educational or training needs in the future. The program will eventually be rolled out to all Canadians; however, we must start with our own clubs. We will need to ensure, that we as Kin, live up to our obligations.

While putting together a presentation for the Cirillo family, we are connected to the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Brigade in Hamilton. Founder Hal's barracks. As discussions with the Commanding Officer of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, Lt. Col. Lawrence Hatfield, we find another Kin connection. Ironically Andrew Hatfield (Kin ODAC) is the Lt. Col.'s brother. Their father is a Life Member of Kin.

In the spirit of Founders Day, the Cpl. Cirillo presentation date is set for February 23rd at the armory. The foundation commissioned a painting of Cpl. Cirillo to be donated to the museum, the Cambridge-North Dumphries Kinsmen commissioned a portrait to be given to the family and one of our proud sponsors of the Portraits of Honour National tour, Jim Hammill, also an Argyll and Sutherland Highlander, wished for a portrait of Founder Hal in his regimental dress to be donated to the museum. POH Artist Dave Sopha, completed all three oil paintings.

A contingent of Kin, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, Founder Hal's daughter, Diane and grandson Scott, members of the public and the media were gathered for the presentation. Foundation Board members, Kin Canada National Board members, the artist and club

members made various presentations to the brigade and museum. The presentations included a Hal Rogers Fellow, the three portraits, a National President Challenge Coin and Kin Canada Flag. The media interviewed many in attendance and press coverage was extensive. The afternoon was emotionally charged as we honoured one of our own. The kin connections have far reaching tentacles to our communities, we have changed the lives of many and supported Canadians for over ninety-five years.

It is time for us to honour all of our Fallen First Responders, through no fault of their own, have given us the biggest sacrifice. **Their Lives**. It took one to spark a nation in to action, we need to fan that spark to ignite a fire to pay homage to our greatest Canadians. We, as Kin, have many gifts; we also need to count our blessings. There is a tremendous amount of work to be done with regards to the 49th Parallel North Fund, to make it a stable, sustainable lasting legacy. We have the ability to ensure we do our part. Please explore the possibility of you, your club or your community supporting this initiative. We need the families of our Fallen to know, that their loved one made a difference. We will never forget.

Getting Started with Twitter for Your Club

Clubs across the association have jumped on the power of <u>social media</u>, and are using the growing number of social networks to get the word out about their projects and network with other members of the association.

One of the best parts of using social media is the flexibility clubs have to tailor their use of each network to support their goals and their brand. However, when club use is the focus, it shouldn't be anything goes if you want to present a professional, branded image and attract the right kind of attention.

If you are new to using <u>Twitter</u> for clubs, this document will help you make sure you have all of your bases covered as you set the stage for effectively using social media in your club.

Do Your Research

The first step before incorporating Twitter (or any social network) into your marketing strategy is taking time to see what other clubs are doing, what seems to work, and where you may have an advantage. While you don't want to duplicate the approach of another club, you can find some inspiration by seeing how others are already using Twitter to reach their audience, make connections and engage in conversation. <u>Twellow</u> is a good place to start your research by browsing profiles of Twitter users in many different areas.

It's also important to have a solid understanding of how Twitter works so you can reduce the learning curve when you get started.

Create a Plan

Once you have an idea about the different ways you can use Twitter in your club, it's time to incorporate your activities into your overall marketing plan. If you don't have a marketing plan yet, now is the perfect time to create one.

Your Twitter-specific marketing plan should include action steps you plan to take, including how often you will post, what types of information you will share, how you will grow your following, what third-party services you might use, how often you will manage your account, etc.

Complete Your Profile

Once you have been active on Twitter for a few weeks, you become accustomed to looking at people's profiles to see what their avatar looks like, where they are located, what their bio says, and what URL they have listed in their profile. If your own profile is missing any of these components, you could be missing potential connections.

Before starting to follow or interact with anyone on Twitter, make sure you take time to complete each of those four integral parts of your profile. This is what will tell people what you're all about, and give them a clue about what they can expect if they follow you.

Become a Conversationalist

Many Twitter critics will tell you that Twitter is nothing but a lot of noise, with everyone vying for attention, trying to be heard, and screaming over each other. This is absolutely true, if you use Twitter like a microphone, only to spout out one message after the other (and if you follow people who do the same). There is a solution to this, and it's called conversation.

It's easy to get caught up in the numbers game on Twitter by trying to follow and be followed by as many people as possible, as quickly as possible. But that can contribute to the deafening noise. Instead, if you connect with people who are potential consumers, members of the association or others with whom you share a mutual interest, the broadcast will often turn into conversation. And it's the conversation that will help you form relationships.

Track Your Results

After you've been active on Twitter for a month or two, it's time to measure the results. You can do this in a number of ways, including tracking inbound links on your website or blog, using a link shortener that has tracking functionality (i.e., <u>Bitly</u>), or using a social media dashboard that includes stats (i.e., <u>Hootsuite</u>).

There are a number of ways to track your results on Twitter so you can tweak your activity and improve your results over a time.


I have learned to step out of my comfort zone and try new things no matter how far fetched it seems to me. There have been some amazing adventures and there are many more to come.

What's the big secret to **membership retention**?

The answer is realizing that your club is also a community to be served.

"HUH ??? What does that mean?"

If your Club is struggling to recruit members, the answer can be found by looking at the service work you do. Are the projects reflective of the club you are, or the club you want to be? "Wait... what?"

Think about it for a moment... we do projects and serve the community to make the community better. So really, we serve the community we want it to be (not the community we have now). We work hard all year to make our community the best it can be.

The Club works kind of like that, too. If your service projects are old, stale or just not really making a difference, you might find the club itself aging, becoming stale, tired, etc.

If the pulse of your projects is a strong, pounding one - if they're projects that get you into the community, ones you have FUN doing, that appeal to the kind of people you want in your club and make a difference - chances are your Club's pulse will be strong and you won't have a recruitment problem.

Retention naturally evolves and mimics your service work and club culture. The stronger and more positive/impacting those areas are, retention will closely follow.

When members experience negativity/disrespect, no longer value the service work or start wondering if the work will make a difference, that's when members consider leaving.

When members look forward to meetings, have a blast at projects, feel respected/valued and know they're making a difference, they not only stay, they're more inclined to recruit others.




Changes to the New 2014-15 Awards Program

- The Maple Leaf Award of Distinction, the Founders Award For Achievement, and the Member Award of Excellence affidavits must be submitted within four (4) months of completion. A pin is awarded to the recipient, but a plaque may be ordered from Kin Sales.
- Any affidavit may not be signed by the person submitting the affidavit for the award; it must be signed by another club executive.
- The Boake Efficiency Award affidavit has changed slightly for dues and forms to be submitted by the "deadline" rather than "to the satisfaction of the Executive Director."
- The Outstanding Club Award affidavit has a change to Category 5 Part H: directing members to "contact Kin Sales" in bulletin rather than placing a Kin Sales ad in bulletin.
- The Outstanding Zone Award affidavit has a change to Part A number 8: to "Promote Kin Sales" rather than place a Kin Sales ad in bulletin.
- The Founding Members Speaking Award: Eligibility now excludes past members of the National Board as well as present and incoming National Board members.

The Green Club, Green Project and Communication Awards have been retired due to lack of participation.

The National Service Award is to be submitted to the Projects Coordinator. And the Marking Guideline is to be used to ensure that all required elements are included in the presentation.

Few leaders are trained in communication, yet experts agree that communication is one of the most important skills leaders should have on their list of competencies.

To ensure successful communications within your club, it is best to start with the very basics: your knowledge of verbal and non-verbal communications. In your club, these types of communications are continually exchanged, oftentimes without much planning or even the thought that such communications are taking place.

The Importance of Non-Verbal Communication

A famous study by Albert Mehrabian found that non-verbal language makes up 55 percent of how we communicate in face-to-face interactions. He also concluded that we communicate as much as 38 percent of our message through our voice (tone, pitch and so on), with as little as 7 percent through the words we actually say.

Understanding and recognizing the signs and signals that make up this 55 percent can help you when you communicate with others. There are times when we send mixed messages – we say one thing yet our body language reveals something different. This non-verbal language affects how we act and react to others, how they react to us, and whether we gain and maintain credibility.

For instance, it's not always just what you say but how you "say" it, taking into account your eyes, your posture, your overall body language, the voice in which you offer the exchange and even your appearance at the time the communication is exchanged. In verbal communication, an active dialogue is engaged with the use of words. At the same time, non-verbal communication takes place, relying on non-verbal cues, such as gestures, eye contact, facial expressions, even clothing and personal space.

Non-verbal cues are very powerful, making it crucial that you pay attention to your actions as well as the non-verbal cues of those around you. If during your meeting, participants begin to doodle or chat among themselves, they are no longer paying attention to you. Your message has become boring, or your delivery is no longer engaging. While eye contact, facial expressions, posture, gestures, clothing and space are obvious non-verbal communication cues, others strongly influence interpretation of messages, including how the message is delivered. This means paying close attention to your tone of voice, even your voice's overall loudness and pitch.

Be mindful of your own non-verbal cues as well as the non-verbal cues of those around you. Keep your messages short and concise. This means preparing in advance whenever possible. For the impromptu meeting, it means thinking before you speak.

Barriers to Effective Communication

Barriers can arise at any stage of the communication process. When communication is failing, it is of primary importance to identify where the causes for failure are within the communication process.

Take a few minutes to think about the barriers to effective communication in your club. Some of the most common barriers that I hear when working with leaders in organizations are:

- Lack of time to communicate effectively
- Don't have the tools

- Cultural barriers
- Educational differences
- Differences in experience of the membership

In reality, all barriers to effective communication fall into three broad categories. These categories are related to the:

- 1. External Environment this would include the space in which you are communicating, the communication tools used (handouts, PowerPoint or no tools used), the method of communication (written, verbal, meetings, one-on-one, etc.) and the communication as it relates to your club culture.
- 2. Speaker any language barrier between the speaker and listener, lack of training for the speaker, lack of understanding of the audience, or educational difference between the speaker and the audience would be included in this category.
- 3. Internal Receiver this would involve any language barrier between the listener and the speaker, lack of experience of the listener, educational differences between the speaker and the listener, or any pre-conceived ideas or opinions of the listener.

It is always best to take the time to plan for any communication. The following simple process will help you overcome these barriers and ensure precise, professional and effective communication in your club. Remember, the communication process is comprised of four basic elements: sender, message, method and environment, and receiver.

The Communication Process

Sender: The sender must establish credibility by displaying knowledge of the subject, the audience and the context of the delivery. The burden of responsibility lies with the sender to ensure that the message is understood and that expectations for deliverables are clearly defined.

Message: Consider the message being sent. Written, verbal and non-verbal communications are affected by the sender's tone, method of communication and what is included or left out of the message. If you choose to send a written message, be sure that it is professional, precise, clear and written in simple language.

Always keep in mind that written communications are open to interpretation.

Proof your written communication for typos, grammar, punctuation and sentence structure to reduce the chances of miscommunication and to ensure that you maintain professional credibility.

Method and Environment: Messages are conveyed through channels. These channels are affected by the method and environment with which you choose to communicate. Potential channels include verbal communication, face to face, telephone, video conference, written communication, meetings, etc.

It is wise to consider the method of communication prior to communicating your message. For example, an e-mail, letter or memo may not be the best way to communicate critical information. All written communication is one-way communication, meaning that there is little to no opportunity for people to ask questions, express concern or gain clarification in a timely manner.

If the message that you are sending is informational in nature, sending it in written form, such as e-mail, is a very efficient way to communicate quickly with many people based in a wide geographic area.

However, if the message conveys critical information – such as changes in policies, processes, procedures or organizational changes – the best method of communication is face to face. You will have to give some thought as to the right environment for the face-to-face communication, e.g., one-on-one individual communication or communicating the information to a group in a meeting.

Receiver: Messages are delivered to your audience, the receivers of the message. Your audience enters into the communication process with ideas and feelings that influence their understanding of your message and dictate their response.

Often, the receivers have pre-conceived ideas or opinions about the topic of your communication. For example, you may be communicating a new initiative, but the audience is already tuning you out because this idea was tried two years ago and did not work.

As the sender, you must also consider the barriers that may interfere with the receivers' ability to understand the message. These barriers include language, ethnic cultural beliefs, level of education and/or level of experience, to name a few.

While creating your plan for effective communication, consider not only the communication process outlined above but also the following four strategies:

Meet Individual Needs

Know the members as individuals so you can understand the receivers' personality traits, gender, generation, education and ethnicity/culture/language.

Utilize resources relevant to members needs to select the right method. These resources may include meetings (monthly, weekly), one-on-one meetings with members (face-to-face, telephone), newsletters, bulletin boards, voicemails, e-mails, and video conferencing.

Regularly assess the effectiveness of communication methods and evaluate the environmental factors and internal receiver factors, such as possible distractions, time and comfort of the room.

Be Timely

Avoid premature communication, but communicate change as soon as possible. Determine the appropriate method for the situation.

Understand the Impact of Non-Verbal and Written Communication

Be aware of how non-verbal communication (body language) affects the message. Also, make sure that written communication sends a concise and professional message. Double-check spelling, grammar and punctuation. Choose a readable font and use humor sparingly or avoid it altogether. If you insist on injecting humor into your written communication, be sure that it is appropriate for all audiences and cannot be misconstrued in any way.

Follow this example format so your written communication is clear, precise and actionable:

What is the key point or message?

Why is this important/ how is it relevant to goals?

Action: What you need them to do.

Contact: For questions or concerns, provide contact information.

In reality, no matter the size of your club, by successfully getting your message across, you convey your thoughts and ideas effectively. When not successful, the thoughts and ideas that you actually send do not necessarily reflect what you think, causing a communications breakdown and creating roadblocks that stand in the way of your goals.


